

vious research and theory as a result of the (almost) exclusive emphasis on recent publications. In general, however, the volume does represent a most useful contribution to a field of inquiry which so far shows no signs of neglect, benign or otherwise.

Where do the editors go from here? What will they give us as an encore? What will they do if the "geometrical expansion" continues?
