leave a situation alone. They will be concerned to see that no child is hurt, that a peace ethic reigns in the classroom, and that children are actively taught tolerance. They will respect the right of the child to take natural breaks for rest, exercise and relaxation, joining the group when ready.

They will encourage choice of activity from a wide range of materials - the only strictures being that materials used are replaced ready for the next person.

## Conclusions.

The work of Maria Montessori has often been misunderstood or misinterpreted. She had to leave Italy during the Fascist regime, as to teach children to think for themselves was not a popular idea. Her ideas are still being questioned and sometimes her philosophy is lost or diluted because of a lack of understanding of the basic principles on which she worked.

The close integration of theory and practice and the resources for learning which each student builds up during the training, offer another approach to training.

It was the hope of Maria Montessori that 'new children' would provide for 'the emergence of the New Man who will no longer be the victim of events but, thanks to his clarity of vision, will become able to direct and to mould the future of mankind.'
