The question is whether we can afford these - when all we need to do is care for our children more closely, give them more time to be children and give ourselves the opportunity to be with them. We have to create more space in our minds for our children and accept the fact that children need us. We have to abandon the notion that children will grow up better if they are forced to develop prematurely.

We must provide more time for adults to be with children at play. Play is a crucial

aspect of children's social, emotional, physical, and cognitive development. Without the time to play and without adults to be catalysts for their play, children are "shortchanged," and are deprived of a healthy development.

At this time of OMEP's 40th birthday, when we celebrate our beginnings, we must not forget why we are here, why we exist. We are here for the children, we exist solely to make the lives of children better - to make sure they have the opportunity to be children, to enjoy childhood, and to be happily involved with adults. This is why we are an organization. Of course we do a lot of other things - but we must continue to make the lives of children richer, to allow them the time to learn to adapt to the many different situations which only play can provide. We have to make sure that all children have adults to give them the care and education they all deserve.

With these goals, we can wish ourselves a Happy Birthday celebration.
