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Planck constant as spectral parameter in integrable systems and KZB equations

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ABSTRACT: We construct special rational gl_N Knizhnik-Zamolodchikov-Bernard (KZB) equations with \tilde{N} punctures by deformation of the corresponding quantum gl_N rational R-matrix. They have two parameters. The limit of the first one brings the model to the ordinary rational KZ equation. Another one is τ . At the level of classical mechanics the deformation parameter τ allows to extend the previously obtained modified Gaudin models to the modified Schlesinger systems. Next, we notice that the identities underlying generic (elliptic) KZB equations follow from some additional relations for the properly normalized R-matrices. The relations are noncommutative analogues of identities for (scalar) elliptic functions. The simplest one is the unitarity condition. The quadratic (in R matrices) relations are generated by noncommutative Fay identities. In particular, one can derive the quantum Yang-Baxter equations from the Fay identities. The cubic relations provide identities for the KZB equations as well as quadratic relations for the classical r -matrices which can be treated as halves of the classical Yang-Baxter equation. At last we discuss the R-matrix valued linear problems which provide $gl_{\tilde{N}}$ CM models and Painlevé equations via the above mentioned identities. The role of the spectral parameter plays the Planck constant of the quantum R-matrix. When the quantum gl_N R-matrix is scalar $(N = 1)$ the linear problem reproduces the Krichever's ansatz for the Lax matrices with spectral parameter for the $gl_{\tilde{N}}$ CM models. The linear problems for the quantum CM models generalize the KZ equations in the same way as the Lax pairs with spectral parameter generalize those without it.

1 Introduction

Let V be a finite-dimensional module of the group GL_N . The quantum R-matrix is an operator $R: V \otimes V \to V \otimes V$ satisfying the quantum Yang-Baxter equation [\[52](#page-27-0)[–57\]](#page-27-1):

$$
R_{12}^{\hbar}(z-w) R_{13}^{\hbar}(z) R_{23}^{\hbar}(w) = R_{23}^{\hbar}(w) R_{13}^{\hbar}(z) R_{12}^{\hbar}(z-w) , \qquad (1.1)
$$

where z, w - spectral parameters. We consider a special class of non-dynamical R -matrices which includes Belavin's elliptic gl_N R-matrix and its (nontrivial) degenerations, i.e. z is a local coordinate on the (degenerated) elliptic curve. Let us fix the normalization of $R[†]$ in the way that the unitarity condition takes the form

$$
R_{12}^{\hbar}(z)R_{21}^{\hbar}(z) = 1 \otimes 1\Phi^{\hbar}(z)\Phi^{\hbar}(-z)\,,\tag{1.2}
$$

where $\Phi^{\hbar}(z)$ is the function defined in the elliptic case^{[1](#page-2-0)} as

$$
\Phi^{\hbar}(z) = N\phi(N\hbar, z), \quad \phi(z, u) = \frac{\vartheta'(0)\vartheta(u+z)}{\vartheta(z)\vartheta(u)}, \tag{1.3}
$$

where $\vartheta(z) = \theta_{11}(z|\tau)$ is the odd Riemann theta-function, τ — elliptic moduli.

We demonstrate here that starting with the R-matrix one can construct different families of classical and quantum integrable system. These constructions are based on two special features of the R-matrices. The first one is the quasi-classical expansion. With the normalization (1.2) – (1.3) it acquires the form:

$$
R_{12}^{\hbar}(z) = \frac{1}{\hbar} 1 \otimes 1 + r_{12}(z) + \hbar m_{12}(z) + O(\hbar^2), \qquad (1.4)
$$

where $r_{12}(z)$ $r_{12}(z)$ $r_{12}(z)$ is the classical r-matrix. It leads to integrable Euler-Arnold gl_N tops² and Gaudin systems.

The second is the property of Painlevé-Calogero correspondence, which is equivalent to the heat equation:

$$
\partial_{\tau} R_{12}^{\hbar}(z) = \partial_{z} \partial_{\hbar} R_{12}^{\hbar}(z) \tag{1.5}
$$

The latter leads to the monodromy preserving equations (non-autonomous tops, Schlesinger systems) and the KZB systems.

At last, the main tool is the set of identities for the quantum R -matrices which we introduce below. R-matrix is an operator acting on the tensor product of vector spaces V . Consider a set of points $z_1, \ldots, z_{\tilde{N}}$ (on the curve where z is a local coordinate). Let

$$
R_{ab}^{\hbar} = R^{\hbar}(z_a - z_b), \qquad (1.6)
$$

be the R-matrix acting on the a-th and b-th components of $V^{\otimes N}$. In our case R-matrices satisfy the following property:

$$
R_{ab}^{\hbar}(z_a - z_b) = -R_{ba}^{-\hbar}(z_b - z_a), \qquad (1.7)
$$

i.e. the terms of the expansion [\(1.4\)](#page-2-3) are of definite parity:

$$
r_{ab} = -r_{ba} \,, \quad m_{ab} = m_{ba} \,. \tag{1.8}
$$

We show that the R -matrices satisfy a set of relations similar to identities for function $\phi(z, u)$ [\(1.3\)](#page-2-1). In particular, $\phi(z, u)$ satisfies the Fay identity

$$
\phi(x, z_{ab})\phi(y, z_{bc}) = \phi(x - y, z_{ab})\phi(y, z_{ac}) + \phi(y - x, z_{bc})\phi(x, z_{ac}),
$$
(1.9)

where $z_{ab} = z_a - z_b$. We notice that the following analogue of the Fay identity holds:

$$
R_{ab}^{\hbar} R_{bc}^{\hbar'} = R_{ac}^{\hbar'} R_{ab}^{\hbar - \hbar'} + R_{bc}^{\hbar' - \hbar} R_{ac}^{\hbar} \tag{1.10}
$$

It will be shown that one can derive the quantum Yang-Baxter equation [\(1.1\)](#page-1-2) from [\(1.10\)](#page-2-4).

¹In the rational case we use $\Phi^{\hbar}(z) = z^{-1} + \hbar^{-1}$. The trigonometric case will be considered separately.

²The integrable tops were previously proved to be related (equivalent) to the (spin) Calogero-Ruijsenaars models by the symplectic Hecke transformations. See. e.g. [\[35,](#page-26-0) [37](#page-26-1)[–40](#page-26-2)].

While the quantum R-matrix is similar to $\phi(\hbar, z)$ the classical r-matrix is the analogue of function $E_1(z) = \partial_z \log \vartheta(z)$. For example, the following relation holds:

$$
(r_{ab} + r_{bc} + r_{ca})^2 = 1_a \otimes 1_b \otimes 1_c N^2 (\wp(z_a - z_b) + \wp(z_b - z_c) + \wp(z_c - z_a)), \qquad (1.11)
$$

where $\varphi(z)$ is the Weierstrass φ -function with moduli τ . It is the analogue of the identity

$$
(E_1(z_a - z_b) + E_1(z_b - z_c) + E_1(z_c - z_a))^2 = \wp(z_a - z_b) + \wp(z_b - z_c) + \wp(z_c - z_a). \tag{1.12}
$$

Together with [\(1.11\)](#page-3-0) the classical Yang-Baxter equation

$$
[r_{ab}, r_{ac}] + [r_{ac}, r_{bc}] + [r_{ab}, r_{bc}] = 0 \tag{1.13}
$$

leads to the following relations:

$$
r_{ab}r_{ac} - r_{bc}r_{ab} + r_{ac}r_{bc} = m_{ab} + m_{bc} + m_{ac}.
$$
 (1.14)

Difference of (1.14) written for indices a, b, c and a, c, b gives (1.13) .

Let us remark that the class of R-matrices we discuss here includes Baxter-Belavin's one [\[5](#page-25-0)[–7](#page-25-1)] as the most general. Its trigonometric analogue was found in [\[4](#page-24-0), [16](#page-25-2)] (we are going to consider it in separate publications). At last the rational case is known from [\[16,](#page-25-2) [39,](#page-26-3) [40,](#page-26-2) [58](#page-27-2)[–60\]](#page-27-3). In the simplest cases one gets the ordinary XXZ and XXX Yang's R-matrices. In the rational case the Yang's R-matrix $[61]$ (with normalization (1.2)) is of the form:

$$
R_{ab}^{\hbar,\text{Yang}} = \frac{1_a \otimes 1_b}{\hbar} + \frac{P_{ab}}{z_a - z_b},\tag{1.15}
$$

where P_{ab} is the permutation operator. We deal with non-trivial deformations of (1.15) . In particular, they allow us to define not only KZ but also KZB equations. At the same time the rest of our construction works for ordinary XXX (and XXZ) R-matrices as well.^{[3](#page-3-4)}

The purpose of the paper. is twofold. First, we construct the rational analogue of the (elliptic) KZB equations. For this purpose we find τ deformation of the quantum R-matrix suggested in [\[39](#page-26-3), [40\]](#page-26-2). Second, we show that integrable systems of Calogero-Moser type admit higher rank Lax representations which generalize the Krichever's one [\[30\]](#page-26-4) in the same way as [\(1.10\)](#page-2-4) generalize [\(1.9\)](#page-2-5). The standard (non-diagonal) matrix elements $\phi(\lambda, z_a - z_b)$ are replaced by the quantum R-matrices R_{ab}^{λ} , i.e. the spectral parameter is given by the Planck constant entering R-matrix. Our constructions are independent of specific form of the R-matrix, but based only on the set of identities (such as (1.10) , (1.14) , (1.5)) which can be verified separately.

Rational KZB equations. Besides the standard trigonometric and rational versions of the elliptic R-matrix there are more sophisticated degenerations. In this paper we consider one of them [\[39,](#page-26-3) [40](#page-26-2)] and show that it leads to some modifications of the standard Gaudin and Schlesinger systems and the KZ (KZB) equations.

The Belavin's R-matrix depends on the moduli of the elliptic curve τ . We notice that it satisfies the heat equation (1.5) and treat this equation as Painevé-Calogero property. In [\[31,](#page-26-5) [32](#page-26-6)] it was formulated in the following way: the Lax pair of the CM model satisfies also the monodromy preserving equations and describe the (higher rank) Painlevé equations. We refer to [\(1.5\)](#page-2-6) as the heat equation because this equation for the function $\phi(\hbar, z)$ follows from the heat equation for ϑ -function $2\partial_{\tau}\vartheta(z|\tau) = \partial_z^2\vartheta(z|\tau)$.

The natural (noncommutative) analogue of ϑ -function is the modification of bundle $\Xi(z,\tau)$. In the elliptic case it was found in [\[26\]](#page-26-7) in the context of the IRF-Vertex transformation, and then described in [\[35](#page-26-0)] (see also [\[37](#page-26-1)[–40\]](#page-26-2)) as an example of the Symplectic Hecke Correspondence for integrable systems. Its rational analogue was suggested in [\[3\]](#page-24-1) and was know to be free of τ dependence. Here we explain how to introduce the τ -dependence. We construct the τ deformation of the rational R-matrix based on the heat equation

$$
2\partial_{\tau}\Xi = \partial_z^2\Xi\,. \tag{1.16}
$$

The solution provides possibility for construction of the rational analogue of the KZB equations

$$
\begin{cases}\n\hat{\nabla}_a \psi = 0, & \nabla_a = \partial_{z_a} + \sum_{c \neq a} \mathfrak{r}_{ac}^{\tau}(z_a - z_c), \\
\hat{\nabla}_\tau \psi = 0, & \nabla_\tau = \partial_\tau + \frac{1}{2} \sum_{b,c} \mathfrak{m}_{bc}^{\tau}(z_b - z_c),\n\end{cases}
$$
\n(1.17)

where r and m are the terms of the expansion [\(1.4\)](#page-2-3) and τ indicates the τ -deformation. The system of KZ of KZB equations is known to be related to the quantum (and classical) CM models by the Matsuo-Cherednik construction $[17, 46]$ $[17, 46]$ (see also $[47]$). Recently relations between CM (and Ruijsenaars-Schneider (RS)) models to quantum spin chains were actively investigated [\[1](#page-24-2), [2](#page-24-3), [27\]](#page-26-8).

2. R-matrix valued Lax pairs. The Fay type identities (1.10) for the quantum Rmatrices allows to suggest extended version of the Krichever's ansatz for CM Lax pairs with spectral parameter [\[30](#page-26-4)]. Consider the following block matrix Lax operator

$$
\mathcal{L} = \sum_{a,b=1}^{\tilde{N}} \tilde{E}_{ab} \otimes \mathcal{L}_{ab}
$$
 (1.18)

where $\tilde{\mathbf{E}}_{ab}$ is the standard basis of $\mathbf{gl}_{\tilde{N}}$ and

$$
\mathcal{L}_{ab} = \delta_{ab} p_a \, 1_a \otimes 1_b + \nu (1 - \delta_{ab}) R_{ab}^{\hbar} \,, \quad R_{ab}^{\hbar} = R_{ab}^{\hbar} (z_a - z_b) \,. \tag{1.19}
$$

When $N = 1$ the gl_N R-matrix reduces to its scalar analogue — function $\phi(z, \hbar)$ and we reproduce the answer from $[30]$ for \tilde{N} -body CM system. Notice that the Planck constant of gl_N R-matrix plays here the role of the spectral parameter for gl_N CM model. The corresponding M-operator is given in [\(4.14\)](#page-17-0). The Lax equation $\partial_t \mathcal{L} = [\mathcal{L}, \mathcal{M}]$ is equivalent to dynamics of N CM particles

$$
\ddot{z}_a = N^2 \nu^2 \sum_{b \neq a} \wp'(z_a - z_b). \tag{1.20}
$$

In the same way the monodromy preserving equation $\partial_{\tau} \mathcal{L} - \partial_{\hbar} \mathcal{M} = [\mathcal{L}, \mathcal{M}]$ leads to the Painlevé equations

$$
\partial_{\tau}^{2} z_{a} = N^{2} \nu^{2} \sum_{b \neq a} \wp'(z_{a} - z_{b}). \tag{1.21}
$$

The corresponding linear problem has the form

$$
(\partial_{\hbar} + \mathcal{L})\Psi = 0. \tag{1.22}
$$

Let us also mention that the linear problem for the quantum version of CM model

$$
\hat{\mathcal{L}}\Psi = \Psi\Lambda \,, \quad \hat{\mathcal{L}}_{ab} = \delta_{ab} \,\partial_{z_a} \,1_a \otimes 1_b + \nu (1 - \delta_{ab}) R_{ab}^\hbar \tag{1.23}
$$

resembles very much the KZ connections from the first line of (1.17) . Equation (1.23) (or (1.22) with $\hat{\mathcal{L}}$) generalizes the first line of (1.17) in the same way as the Lax pairs with spectral parameter generalize those without it. We hope to clarify exact relations between R-matrix valued linear problems and KZB equations in our future papers.

Choosing elliptic, trigonometric or the rational R-matrix we describe the CM models similarly to gl_1 case [\[30\]](#page-26-4). Notice that the gl_N R-matrix itself describes gl_N integrable systems such as integrable tops which are gauge equivalent to CM or RS models. Here we use gl_N R-matrices as auxiliary spaces for derivation of gl_N models. The next natural step is to get similar result for the Ruijsenaars-Schneider (quantum) model. In this case we deal with two Planck constants. Our general idea is that the both Planck constants can play different roles, i.e. each of the constants can be either the spectral parameter in a "classical-quantum" gl_Ñ system (of [\(1.19\)](#page-4-1) type) or the Planck constant in a quantum gl_N system or the relativistic deformation parameter in a classical relativistic gl_N model (see $[39, 40]$ $[39, 40]$).^{[4](#page-5-3)} We hope that this can shed light on numerous dualities in integrable systems mentioned in [\[19](#page-25-4), [43](#page-27-6)[–45,](#page-27-7) [48,](#page-27-8) [62](#page-28-1)[–64](#page-28-2)].

2 From integrable tops to KZB equations

In this section we describe the sequence of steps which leads to the KZB equations [\[20](#page-25-5)[–22\]](#page-25-6) starting from integrable tops. As it was mentioned above, our consideration is independent on the choice of particular top model. The basic element is the underlying quantum Rmatrix [\[39,](#page-26-3) [40](#page-26-2)].

First, we briefly recall the structures underlying integrable tops and proceed to the nonautonomous dynamics. It is described by the monodromy preserving equations. In the same way the Schlesinger system is originated from the corresponding Gaudin model. At last, the KZB equations arise from the quantization of the Schlesinger system [\[28,](#page-26-9) [29,](#page-26-10) [33](#page-26-11), [34](#page-26-12), [49\]](#page-27-9).

⁴Let us also remark that in [\[41](#page-26-13), [42\]](#page-26-14) we have already found an R-matrix intermediate between the Belavin's and the Felders' one. Her we use a different description. Presumably, the interrelation between different descriptions is given by the Fourier-Mukai type transformation.

2.1 Integrable tops

In [\[39](#page-26-3), [40\]](#page-26-2) we defined the relativistic integrable top by means of the quantum R-matrix. The gl_N Lax matrix is given by

$$
L^{\eta}(z, S) = \text{tr}_2(R_{12}^{\eta}(z)S_2), \quad S = \underset{z=0}{\text{Res}} L^{\eta}(z, S), \tag{2.1}
$$

where $S = \sum_{i=1}^{N}$ $\sum_{i,j=1}^{N}$ E_{ij}S_{ij} is the gl_N-valued dynamical variable,^{[5](#page-6-1)} and $R_{12}^{\eta}(z)$ is the corresponding quantum non-dynamical R-matrix. It satisfies the quantum Yang-Baxter equa-tion [\(1.1\)](#page-1-2). The non-relativistic limit $(\eta \to 0)$

$$
L^{\eta}(z, S) = \eta^{-1} \frac{\text{tr}S}{N} 1_{N \times N} + L(z, S) + \eta \mathcal{M}(z, S) + O(\eta^{2})
$$
 (2.2)

is related to the classical limit $(\hbar \rightarrow 0)$ [\(1.4\)](#page-2-3) via [\(2.1\)](#page-6-2):

$$
L(z, S) = \text{tr}_2(r_{12}(z)S_2), \qquad S = \underset{z=0}{\text{Res}} L(z, S), \qquad (2.3)
$$

$$
\mathcal{M}(z, S) = \text{tr}_2(m_{12}(z)S_2) \tag{2.4}
$$

The quantity $r_{12}(z)$ in [\(1.4\)](#page-2-3), [\(2.3\)](#page-6-3) is the classical r-matrix. It is skew-symmetric [\(1.8\)](#page-2-7)

$$
r_{12}(z) = -r_{21}(-z) \tag{2.5}
$$

and satisfies the classical Yang-Baxter equation:

$$
[r_{12}(z-w), r_{13}(z)] + [r_{12}(z-w), r_{23}(w)] + [r_{13}(z), r_{23}(w)] = 0.
$$
 (2.6)

As it was mentioned in $[39, 40]$ $[39, 40]$ $[39, 40]$ the matrices $(2.3), (2.4)$ $(2.3), (2.4)$ appear to be the Lax pair of the non-relativistic top. It means that the Lax equation

$$
\partial_t L(z, S) = [L(z, S), \mathcal{M}(z, S)] \tag{2.7}
$$

is equivalent to equations of motion

$$
\partial_t S = [S, J(S)],\tag{2.8}
$$

where the inverse inertia tensor is given by the linear functional

$$
J(S) = \mathcal{M}(0, S). \tag{2.9}
$$

The equations (2.8) are Hamiltonian with the Hamiltonian function

$$
\mathcal{H}^{\text{top}}(S) = \frac{1}{2} \operatorname{tr}(S J(S)) \tag{2.10}
$$

and the Poisson-Lie brackets on gl_N^*

$$
\{S_1, S_2\} = [S_2, P_{12}] \tag{2.11}
$$

or $\{S_{ij}, S_{kl}\} = \delta_{il}S_{ki} - \delta_{ki}S_{il}.$

 $^{5}\text{E}_{ij}, i,j = 1...N\}$ is the standard basis in the fundamental representation of gl_N : $(E_{ij})_{kl} = \delta_{ik}\delta_{jl}$.

2.2 Painlevé-Calogero correspondence and non-autonomous tops

The (classical) Painlevé-Calogero correspondence was suggested in $[31, 32]$ $[31, 32]$. It claims that the (Krichever's) Lax pair of the elliptic Calogero-Moser model can be also used for the monodromy preserving equations, which describe the higher rank Painlevé equations in the elliptic form.

Let us formulate here the Painlevé-Calogero correspondence in the form of the quantum non-dynamical R-matrix property.

Definition 1. Suppose that the quantum R-matrix entering (2.1) depends on some additional parameter τ : $R^{\hbar,\tau}(z) = R(z,\hbar,\tau)$. We say that the R-matrix satisfies the property of the "Painlevé-Calogero correspondence" if the following relation holds:^{[6](#page-7-1)}

$$
\partial_{\tau} R^{\hbar,\tau}(z) = \partial_z \partial_{\hbar} R^{\hbar,\tau}(z) \,. \tag{2.12}
$$

Plugging the expansion (1.4) into (2.12) we get a set of relations. The first non-trivial is

$$
\partial_{\tau}r_{12}^{\tau}(z) = \partial_z m_{12}^{\tau}(z) , \qquad (2.13)
$$

where $r_{12}^{\tau}(z) = r_{12}(z,\tau)$ is the classical r-matrix. An example of the R-matrix with this property is given by the Baxter-Belavin's one [\[5](#page-25-0)] (see appendix B). The parameter τ in this example equals $\tau^{ell}/2\pi i$, where τ^{ell} is the module of the underlying elliptic curve, and the property (2.13) is due to the heat equation for the theta-functions

$$
2\partial_{\tau}\vartheta(z|\tau) = \partial_z^2\vartheta(z|\tau). \tag{2.14}
$$

From (2.13) and (2.3) – (2.4) it follows that

$$
\frac{\partial}{\partial \tau} L^{\tau}(z, S) = \frac{\partial}{\partial z} \mathcal{M}^{\tau}(z, S), \qquad (2.15)
$$

where $L^{\tau}(z, S) = L(z, S, \tau), \mathcal{M}^{\tau}(z, S) = \mathcal{M}(z, S, \tau).$ Therefore, we can define the monodromy preserving equations in time τ

$$
d_{\tau}L^{\tau}(z,S) - \partial_z \mathcal{M}^{\tau}(z,S) = [L^{\tau}(z,S), \mathcal{M}^{\tau}(z,S)], \quad S = S(\tau)
$$
 (2.16)

 $(d_{\tau} = \frac{d}{d_{\tau}})$ as the non-autonomous version of the integrable top's equations of motion (2.8) :^{[7](#page-7-4)}

$$
\partial_{\tau} S = [S, J^{\tau}(S)]. \tag{2.17}
$$

Indeed, the total derivative $d_{\tau}L^{\tau}(z, S)$ contains both — the partial derivatives by explicit and implicit dependence on τ :

$$
d_{\tau}L^{\tau}(z, S(\tau)) = d_{\tau}\text{tr}_2(r_{12}^{\tau}(z)S_2) = \text{tr}_2((\partial_{\tau}r_{12}^{\tau}(z))S_2) + \text{tr}_2(r_{12}^{\tau}(z)(\partial_{\tau}S_2)).
$$
 (2.18)

The first term is cancelled by $\partial_z \mathcal{M}^{\tau}(z, S)$ [\(2.15\)](#page-7-5), and we get the same result as in [\(2.8\)](#page-6-5) fol-lowing from the Lax equations [\(2.7\)](#page-6-6). But this time it contains explicit dependence on τ via

$$
J^{\tau}(S) = \mathcal{M}^{\tau}(0, S). \tag{2.19}
$$

Similarly to the autonomous case this system is Hamiltonian (see (2.10)) with

$$
\mathcal{H}^{\tau}(S) = \frac{1}{2} \operatorname{tr}(S J^{\tau}(S)) \tag{2.20}
$$

and the Poisson brackets are given by [\(2.11\)](#page-6-8).

Let us keep the notation $\frac{\partial}{\partial \tau}$ (but not ∂_{τ}) for the partial derivative by only explicit dependence on τ , i.e.

$$
\frac{\partial}{\partial \tau} L^{\tau}(z, S(\tau)) = \text{tr}_2\Big((\partial_{\tau} r_{12}^{\tau}(z)) S_2(\tau)\Big). \tag{2.21}
$$

2.3 Gaudin models

The phase space of the Gaudin model $[8-11]$ is the direct product of n coadjoint orbits, i.e. \tilde{N} copies of $S: S^a \in \mathfrak{gl}_N$, $a = 1, \ldots, \tilde{N}$ with some fixed eigenvalues. Its Poisson structure

Here we imply the existence of the deformation parameter τ [\(2.14\)](#page-7-6)–[\(2.20\)](#page-8-1) from the very beginning in order not to repeat (almost) the same notations with τ and without τ as we made for the top and its non-autonomous version.

2.4 Schlesinger systems

Similarly to the description of Painlevé equation in the form of non-autonomous tops let us also represent the Schlesinger system [\[50](#page-27-10), [51\]](#page-27-11) as the non-autonomous Gaudin model.

The relation between KZB equations and the quantum monodromy preserving equations was described in [\[49](#page-27-9)] (see also [\[28,](#page-26-9) [29](#page-26-10), [33,](#page-26-11) [34\]](#page-26-12)). The fundamental representation is given by $\rho_N(e_{ij}^a) = 1 \otimes \ldots \otimes 1 \otimes E_{ij} \otimes 1 \otimes \ldots \otimes 1$, where $(E_{ij})_{kl} = \delta_{ik}\delta_{jl}$ is on the a-th place. Then r-matrix is an operator acting on the a-th and b-th components of an element of the tensor product $V^{\otimes \tilde{N}}$. The operator is represented by matrix of $N^{\tilde{N}} \times N^{\tilde{N}}$ size because it also contains (as factors) the product of identity operators for the rest of components $\otimes 1_c$. The residue of r-matrix is (up to factor N $c \neq a,b$ in $(B.11)$ the permutation operator replacing a-th and b-th components of an element of the tensor product $V^{\otimes \tilde{N}}$ to which ψ belongs.

3 Rational non-autonomous tops and KZB equations

The rational top was first studied for small rank cases in [\[58](#page-27-2)[–60\]](#page-27-3) by degenerating the elliptic Lax matrix [\[35](#page-26-0)]. Later it was constructed for gl_N case using its relation to the rational Calogero-Moser model [\[3\]](#page-24-1). The idea was to compute the classical (skew-symmetric nondynamical) r-matrix as follows:

In $[39, 40]$ $[39, 40]$ this relation was extended to the quantum R-matrix by proceeding to the relativistic top:

3.1 τ -deformation of quantum rational R-matrix

Our aim is to construct τ -dependent R-matrix satisfying the Painlevé-Calogero property (2.12) starting from the τ -independent one (3.2) . The answer follows from (3.8) (see below). It appears that the deformation of the Yang's rational R-matrix suggested in [\[39,](#page-26-3) [40](#page-26-2)] admits this kind of deformation similarly to the elliptic case. The idea is to deform first $\Xi(z)$ [\(3.4\)](#page-12-4). Let us find $\Xi(z, q|\tau)$ satisfying the heat equation

Let us summarize the results:

Proposition 1. The τ -deformed quantum R-matrix [\(3.13\)](#page-13-5) satisfies the Painlevé-Calogero property (2.12) .

Proposition 2. The τ -deformed quantum r and m-matrices [\(3.14\)](#page-13-6) define the KZB equa-tions [\(2.38\)](#page-10-4), i.e. the corresponding KZB connections ∇_a [\(2.39\)](#page-10-2) and ∇_{τ} [\(2.40\)](#page-10-3) are compatible [\(2.48\)](#page-11-2), [\(2.49\)](#page-11-5).

The proof is direct. Below we give explicit examples of τ -deformations in the rational case.

4 Planck constant as spectral parameter

4.1 R-matrix valued Fay identities

In this paragraph we show that the quantum R-matrices satisfy a set of relations which are similar to their scalar analogues — the functions Φ [\(1.2\)](#page-1-1). It is convenient to discuss the elliptic case $(B.5)$ – $(B.14)$ because the trigonometric and rational versions are obtained by some (nontrivial) degenerations.

The function $\phi(x, z)$ [\(B.5\)](#page-23-1) (or [\(B.14\)](#page-24-5)) satisfies the Fay identity:

where $z_{ab} = z_a - z_b$. Let us formulate its noncommutative analogue.

Proposition 3. The Belavin's R-matrix $(B.8)$ satisfies the following relation:

$$

$$
R_{bc}^{\hbar'-\hbar}R_{ac}^{\hbar} = \sum_{\alpha,\beta} T_{\alpha}^{a} T_{\beta-\alpha}^{b} T_{-\beta}^{c} \kappa_{\beta-\alpha,\alpha} \varphi_{\beta-\alpha}^{\hbar'-\hbar}(z_b - z_c) \varphi_{\alpha}^{\hbar}(z_a - z_c) , \qquad (4.5)

Notice that $\kappa_{-\alpha,\beta} = \kappa_{\beta,\alpha-\beta} = \kappa_{\beta-\alpha,\alpha}$ due to [\(B.4\)](#page-23-5). Then the statement [\(4.2\)](#page-15-2) follows from [\(4.1\)](#page-15-3), where $x = \hbar + \omega_{\alpha}$ and $y = \hbar' + \omega_{\beta}$. \Box **Proposition 4.** The quantum Yang-Baxter equation (1.1) follows from (4.2) , the property (1.7) and unitarity condition (1.2) .

It is worth mentioning that in gl_1 case $(N = 1)$ this operator is the Krichever's Lax matrix with spectral parameter for the Calogero-Moser model [\[30\]](#page-26-4). The eigenvalue matrix consists of vectors $\psi_1, \ldots, \psi_{\tilde{N}}$. In the case of quantum CM model $(p_a \to \partial_{z_a})$ equation [\(4.11\)](#page-16-4) should have well defined limit $\hbar \to 0$ which gives the KZ equations for $\psi_1 = \ldots = \psi_{\tilde{N}} = \psi$.

The spectral parameter in (4.13) is \hbar - the Planck constant. The M-operator is defined as follows:

M-operator (4.14) is also straightforward generalization of the one proposed in [\[30\]](#page-26-4) except the last term \mathcal{F}^0 . The latter is not needed in $N = 1$ case because in this case it is proportional to the identity matrix.

The sum of the inputs equals zero. We used that $F_{ab}^0 = F_{ba}^0$ (due to $F_{ab}^0 = \partial_{z_a} r_{ab} (z_a - z_b)$). On a diagonal block we get equations of motion:

It is natural to expect that the same receipt works for other root systems (not only gl_N) as well, i.e. one can replace the function $\phi(x, z)$ in the Lax matrix with the corresponding quantum R-matrix.

Denote the off-diagonal part of [\(4.13\)](#page-16-5) by \mathcal{L}^0 : $\mathcal{L}_{ab}^0 = (1 - \delta_{ab})R_{ab}^{\hbar}$. We conjecture that:^{[13](#page-18-2)}

where \tilde{tr} denotes the trace over $gl_{\tilde{N}}$ component of $\mathcal L$ and the sums do not contain zero arguments (i.e. $b_1 \neq a$, $b_2 \neq b_1, \ldots, b_k \neq a$). Relation [\(4.21\)](#page-18-3) means that traces of \mathcal{L} [\(4.12\)](#page-16-7)–[\(4.13\)](#page-16-5) provides the Hamiltonians of the $gl_{\tilde{N}}$ Calogero-Moser model (where z_a are coordinates of particles).

4.3 Half of the classical Yang-Baxter equation

Consider the unitarity condition $R^{\hbar}_{ab} R^{\hbar}_{ba} = \Phi^{\hbar}(z_{ab}) \Phi^{\hbar}(z_{ba})$. Its expansion in the \hbar^0 order gives

The Proposition result [\(4.39\)](#page-20-3) follows from [\(4.43\)](#page-20-4) and [\(4.38\)](#page-20-5).

4.5 Painlevé equations

The block matrix Lax pair (4.13) , (4.14) can be also used for description of the Painlevé equations likewise it was done in [\[31](#page-26-5), [32\]](#page-26-6) in $N = 1$ case, i.e. the result of Proposition [5](#page-17-1) is naturally generalized to the following one:
